### **KEEPING OUR STUDENTS MENTALLY & PHYSICALLY HEALTHY!**

# ATHLETIC UPDATES

## BEYOND THE GAME: EMBRACING PURPOSE BASED SPORTS FOR LONG-TERM SUCCESS?

Late last fall I was fortunate to be invited to "The Inside Out Initiative" along with other AD's in the Packerland Conference and area schools. A key theme of the initiative is "purpose based sports." One thing we learned is that only 1% of high school athletes will play sports professionally and only 3% will participate at the college level. 96% of high school student's athletic experiences will end with the completion of high school. The skills athletes learn by being part of a team carry on long after high school.

Sports are not the most important thing that schools do, but they are often what students and parents care about the most. At the high school level we are lucky to get 25 visitors on a parent conference night. We easily draw 300 people to a high school basketball game. Purpose-based athletic programs are an extension of the classroom. Our coaches should be teachers who try to influence players to grow athletically, emotionally and socially, to build resilience, to have perseverance, and grit. The purpose of extracurricular activities should be to connect students with the previous listed character traits that a school believes are important.

What about winning? High school sport programs should always prepare, practice, and play to win a game or event. Winning a game should still be the goal of athletics but it is not the purpose.

The success of a coach should not be based on the score of a game or the number of wins in a season. Success should be based on participants coming back as adults, telling us something we did right and in turn, supporting the educational and athletic programs. In purpose-based sports, success is measured beyond the scoreboard. If coaches model and teach desirable traits, the wins will happen.

## ELECTRONIC ATHLETIC REGISTRATION IS COMING

For the 2023–24 school year, enrolling an athlete in a Blue Devil Fall extra-curricular activity is going to look a lot different. Our extra-curricular management tool, **rSchool**, will handle all registrations online. This will be found on the district website. The online registration will handle everything from physicals, handbook information, Permission to Treat, WIAA eligibility, parent contact information, auxiliary insurance, and signatures.

Historically, Oconto coaches and trainers had access to the needed player information through the paperwork. Once registration is complete, this information will now be available to coaches through an rSchool app. Schools using the registration process have reported that the online process makes it easier for parents, athletes, and administrators to access needed information and creates less paperwork. The online enrollment will go into effect on July 1, 2023.

### OHS RECEIVES METAL DONATIONS FROM US NAVY AND FINCANTIERI MARINE





Over the past several months the United States Navy, and Fincantieri Marine of Marinette made 3 very large donations of metal to Oconto High School with a value exceeding \$60,000.00. The donations will help support our metals classes for years to come. In December we were able to procure over 5000 lbs of flat bar that will be able to be used everywhere from welding large projects to making practice coupons for many years.




In January, Mr. Porath was able to hook up the trailer again, and bring home 2 trailers of sheet steel weighing nearly 30,000 lbs. and a value of over \$44,000.00. These sheets have already started to be used by students making welding tables for home, and Tech Challenge projects procuring scholarships to further our students' education.



And finally, in early March, Mr. Porath got 2 more trailers full of angle iron and a flat bar that would be shared by over 10 schools. This angle iron provided a project for one of our students to win the Tech Challenge competition with a well-built trailer.

# UNLOCK YOUR LEADERSHIP POTENTIAL: GB LEAD WORKSHOP AND CONFERENCE FOR HIGH SCHOOL LEADERS

GB Lead is a 3-part leadership workshop and conference designed for emerging and active leaders in high school. Students take a series of personal assessments to help them determine their strengths and improvement areas. The workshops use these assessments and other tools to analyze how they can continue growing in these areas and what resources exist to help them in the process. The following is reviewed, personal values, communication styles, conflict modes, social styles, task vs. person orientation, leadership styles, and more. Students have the opportunity to connect with their peers and learn new ways to advance their leadership abilities.

The main goals of GB Lead are: 1. Learn different types of leadership qualities 2. Identify personal leadership strengths 3. Prepare students for leadership after high school/in college 4. Provide opportunities and resources to help students grow as leaders.

This program takes place at multiple high schools in the area simultaneously. After the three workshops take place at the respective high schools over the course of 3 months, there is a final Leadership Conference at the UW-Green Bay, Marinette Campus. This conference allows students from the different high schools who participated to network with each other and other leaders in their community.





